Step one:

Pick a date, time and location. You can hold your quiz at home, in your office or at a venue (make sure you factor in any hiring costs). We can provide a letter of authenticity to let the venue know its a charity fundraiser.

Step two:

We recommend ticketing your event to guarantee an income. Be sure to price the tickets at a comfortable price for your audience. We recommend between £5 and £10 entry fee per player.

Step three:

The fun part! You can use the Ministry of Stories quiz in this pack or come up with your own. Don't forget to choose a Quiz Master.

Step four:

Make the most of your community, and promote to friends, families and colleagues. Social media is a great tool for publicising your event.

Step five:

Help boost your fundraising and make your quiz fundraiser an event to remember by considering extra activities:

Prizes

What better way to incentivise teams than with a winner and a runner up prize. The sillier the (often) better!

Raffle

Use your contacts to secure some raffle prizes and encourage people to buy raffle tickets.

Sweepstakes

Does your event coincide with a sporting or social event? You can create a sweepstake and get your guests to guess the outcome/ winning score

Match Funding

Some employers generously offer to match any money raised for charity by their staff.

5. Monsters in Literature - In celebration of our store, Hoxton Street Monster Supplies, we delve into monstrous writings.

One point for each correct answer.

There is a total of 74 points available.

BONUS rounds

There are also two additional 'Ministry magic' rounds - **Ode to an Object** and **Wonderful Words** - which can be included if your teams would like a little taste of our young writers world.

We suggest giving the answers at the end of each round and each team to keep a note of their score.

The Quiz Master can also keep a running total for each team, to announce at the end of each round, giving the quiz some momentum.

- What could it be used for

Once you have some key words **write six short lines of poetry which celebrate the object**. The more creative, the better!

But beware! **You mustn't use the actual name of the object in the poem itself or draw a picture of it.**

You now have **5-10 minutes to write your Ode to an Object** until your Quiz Master calls time.

If you manage to write a six line poem, **you will receive three points.**

If they can guess your object, both teams **will receive two points.**
